

Fortunately, I realised what had happened and it was a two minute fix to disconnect the jammed cable.

It is timely that I mention this in the run up to the AGM in August, as we should all be thinking about stepping into one of the positions. 
I have already received quite a number of good contacts. These will be listed on the website shortly. Please add to this list by sending the information either to the car captain for your particular model, or directly to me.

Background information from the RACV.

Florence Thomson was the only female entrant in the 1905 Dunlop Reliability Motor contest from Sydney to Melbourne. From a field of 23 drivers she was one of only 17 contestants to finish the five-day trial. After reaching the finishing point at Coburg the contestants formed a procession to Elizabeth Street, by then Florence's car was laden with floral tributes.

Organised by RACV foundation member Harry James in his role as Dunlop advertising manager, the contest was a trial not a race, designed to test the reliability of the automobile over rough roads. The route followed the old coach road between Sydney and Melbourne (later the Hume Highway) a distance of 920 kilometres.

Mrs Ben Thomson as she was then known had been driving for two years and was behind the wheel of a 6hp Wolseley imported from England for the event.

The previous year she had driven a Beeston Humberette from Adelaide to Melbourne, the first woman to do this – she was a real trailblazer!

We received two interesting articles from TCCV members who participated in the "women drivers only" event the RACV organised in April to honour Florence Thomson's achievements.

Thank you Kerry Payne and Helen Robinson. Sounds like a wonderful day out, there will be more women drivers next year!





Time To Consider

The TCCV is your club so get involved

The August AGM will allow you to nominate for a committee or volunteer position for your car club. Being part of the working group running the club can be very rewarding. By all means feel free to chat to anyone on the committee about how you can he involved

Committee (elected) Positions

PRESIDENT - This position means you have to be able to talk, but the most important task is knowing when to stop! The President keeps meetings on track and provides direction for the club.

VICE PRESIDENT - Pretty well a committee member for most of the time, until called upon to fill in for an absent President. The most onerous task is keeping track of club champion points.

TREASURER – The most important person in the club – especially if they do a runner! The Treasurer is probably the hardest job on the committee, requiring several hours of commitment per week and a bit more at membership renewals time. Have to be able to add and subtract!

Secretary – hardest bit being able to listen in on the meeting and simultaneously make notes that you can later convert into meeting minutes. Also have to clear the mailbox and handle correspondence.

COMMITTEE members (two required) main task is attend the three committee meetings per year and occasional email discussion. Have to contribute to club discussions.

Volunteer Positions

EDITOR – this position probably makes the most impression in the club, every member eagerly awaits the eleven issues of the magazine every month.

PUBLICATIONS GRAPHIC DESIGNER - most important job as Magazine Artistic Director converts the copious quantities of information the editor supplies into the polished format and gives vital assistance to the editor. Also produces certificates, brochures, etc.

WEB MASTER – the first contact most people have of the club is via the website. The Website has grown hugely. Web Master has to be reasonably technically savvy.

MEMBERSHIP SECRETARY - has to process new members – a couple a month and come June gets busy processing the ~244 member renewals.

CLUB PERMIT SECRETARY – has to keep track of the ~120 vehicles on club permits, ensuring renewals are processed for members with the required points and provide warnings for people who don't. Ably assisted by two assistants - to provide a useful spread of people who can sign permits.

EVENTS SECRETARY - what would the car club be without events! Without events we wouldn't have anything to put in the magazine, nothing to talk about at meetings and nowhere to go! The Events Secretary has to be a very good organiser!

BOOK LIBRARIAN – keeper and loaner of club's books.
